
How Safe Are You?


Man brought AR-15 rifle to mall during Thanksgiving weekend, police say

Amid the controversy over gun control and gun violence, we initiate balanced discussions based on facts, hard evidence and data to find real, collaborative, immediate and impacting solutions.

What Is Comprehensive “Gun Control”?

If all parties cannot define Gun Control in an honest, balanced and thorough way, the parties will never agree and thus never find common ground for real, immediate, impacting and lasting solutions. Not one group vs. the other.

Comprehensive and balanced gun control by fair definition should never mean taking necessary firearms from law-abiding citizens. Nor should it mean that the second amendment gives any citizen complete unrestricted and unchecked rights with a firearm of any kind at any time for any reason. Constitutional rights and federal or state laws and city or county ordinances all must co-exist together in balance for the safety of the citizen and the community. This point of view is what both sides are usually missing.

The very phrase “Gun Control” is multi-faceted and has been defined to advance agendas on all sides, from fear to fanaticism, rights to restrictions. But if we make SAFETY the priority of all agendas, keep bias in its place and look at ALL the facts, we can find collaborative solutions without extreme difficulty. We must make America safe again and that requires collaboration.

Gun control, in essence, is about who carries what, when, where, how, why and under what condition or circumstances. Comprehensive Gun Control should therefore include prevention, intervention and recovery.

One-sided agendas and personal preferences do not save lives and all sides will have to give or give up something. Any right that has any restraints or restrictions for the good of the community is not absolute. So let’s have honest and balanced discussions that yield real solutions for our safety.

Georgia Firearms Summary

Including Stand Your Ground Law

Georgia is a [shall-issue](#) state with concealed weapons permits issued at the county level and filed with the probate court in the county of residence.

There is no permit, background check or firearms registration required when buying a handgun from a private individual.

[Open carry](#) is legal in Georgia only with a Georgia Weapons Carry License (WCL) or a concealed carry permit from a state Georgia honors. Some areas are off-limits, including schools and courthouses.

[Concealed carry](#) is legal with a WCL or a license/permit issued by a state that Georgia honors. There is no firearms training required to obtain a Georgia WCL. You must be at least 21 years old (18 for members of the military) to get a concealed carry permit in Georgia. No license is needed to carry a handgun in a person's home, vehicle, place of business, while fishing or hunting, or unloaded in a case. The city of Kennesaw has a law enacted in 1982 requiring every head of household within city limits to maintain a firearm. In terms of [reciprocity](#), Georgia reciprocates in recognizing firearms licenses with states that recognize Georgia permits.

Georgia is a [Castle Doctrine](#) state and has a "[stand your ground](#)" statute. Per **Ga. Code § 16-3-21**, a person does not have a [duty to retreat](#) and is justified in threatening or using force against another when and to the extent that he or she reasonably believes that such threat or force is necessary to defend himself or herself or a third person against such other's imminent use of unlawful force, or to prevent death or great bodily injury to himself or herself or a third person, or to prevent the commission of a forcible felony, such as rape, armed robbery or kidnapping.

2010 Georgia Code

TITLE 16 - CRIMES AND OFFENSES CHAPTER 3 - DEFENSES TO CRIMINAL PROSECUTIONS

ARTICLE 2 - JUSTIFICATION AND EXCUSE

§ 16-3-21 - Use of force in defense of self or others; evidence of belief that force was necessary in murder or manslaughter prosecution

16-3-21. Use of force in defense of self or others; evidence of belief that force was necessary in murder or manslaughter prosecution

(a) A person is justified in threatening or using force against another when and to the extent that he or she reasonably believes that such threat or force is necessary to defend himself or herself or a third person against such other's imminent use of unlawful force; however, except as provided in Code Section 16-3-23, a person is justified in using force which is intended or likely to cause death or great bodily harm only if he or she reasonably believes that such force is necessary to prevent death or great bodily injury to himself or herself or a third person or to prevent the commission of a forcible felony.

(b) A person is not justified in using force under the circumstances specified in subsection (a) of this Code section if he:

(1) Initially provokes the use of force against himself with the intent to use such force as an excuse to inflict bodily harm upon the assailant;

(2) Is attempting to commit, committing, or fleeing after the commission or attempted commission of a felony; or

(3) Was the aggressor or was engaged in a combat by agreement unless he withdraws from the encounter and effectively communicates to such other person his intent to do so and the other, notwithstanding, continues or threatens to continue the use of unlawful force.

(c) Any rule, regulation, or policy of any agency of the state or any ordinance, resolution, rule, regulation, or policy of any county, municipality, or other political subdivision of the state which is in conflict with this Code section shall be null, void, and of no force and effect.

(d) In a prosecution for murder or manslaughter, if a defendant raises as a defense a justification provided by subsection (a) of this Code section, the defendant, in order to establish the defendant's reasonable belief that the use of force or deadly force was immediately necessary, may be permitted to offer:

(1) Relevant evidence that the defendant had been the victim of acts of family violence or child abuse committed by the deceased, as such acts are described in Code Sections 19-13-1 and 19-15-1, respectively; and

(2) Relevant expert testimony regarding the condition of the mind of the defendant at the time of the offense, including those relevant facts and circumstances relating to the family violence or child abuse that are the bases of the expert's opinion.

YOUTH SERVICES & PROGRAMS (1)
(Ages 10-25)



- **Entrepreneur Training Program:** To address poverty and provide alternative career options to students who are not doing well in school or who have decided college or the military is not for them. Youth are taught marketing, leadership, administration, public speaking, HR, legalities, business accounting and how to start and finance a small business. Then they launch businesses.
- **Problem/Conflict Resolution Classes** to provide positive and alternative ways to handle anger, confrontation decision-making and issues youth face daily.
- **Positive Parenting Classes For Youth** to help young parents learn patience, what to expect and how to discipline and interact with their children without violence or verbal abuse.
- **The Metro-Atlanta Life Skills Training Academy (M.A.L.T.A.):** Practical life skills training in 7 core areas generally not taught in many public schools nor at home in many cases for various reasons. Subjects taught include (1) money management, (2) problem/conflict resolution, (3) early career selection/planning/development, (4) entrepreneurship, (5) health and wellness, (6) public speaking and (7) interpersonal relationship building.

- **Youth Open Forum Town Hall Meetings** which provide an opportunity for our youth to speak freely about their frustrations, concerns, ideas, fears and problems while the adults listen. We then use their input to create, adapt and partner with programs and agencies that provide solid core solutions to their problems and concerns. This decreases delinquency, gang activity, hopelessness and recidivism.
- **Student Internships (High School/College)** to get students involved as a proactive part of the solution on another level. This program allows the students to gain experience in our marketing or research department, to add the experience to their, to qualify for our scholarships and to possibly become full time staff members.
- **Volunteer / Community Service Credits** whereby the youth completes necessary volunteer requirements set forth by high schools and universities while helping others stop crime and build self-worth, respect for others, team and leadership skills.
- **The Art of Learning Series:** The Art of Learning provides techniques and strategies on how a student learns and excels, to include study skills, study habits, memorization techniques, concentration techniques, test taking strategies and more. Essay contests included.



Youth Open Forum Town Hall Meetings (Page 1)

Objective:

To provide an open forum outlet for discussion whereby our inner-city youth ages 13-18 can voice their concerns, ideas, suggestions and solutions to crime and violence in metro-Atlanta.

The Need:

At present, a large number of our youth are angry, frustrated, discouraged and unmotivated because they feel a lack of support, a lack of encouragement, a lack of opportunity and a lack of resources or outlets for them to be heard, taught and appreciated. This causes them to rely largely on each other and without solid, stable guidance, they make the wrong choices. When youth do not have the proper outlet to address their concerns, they either turn the frustration inward or make society the recipient of that frustration and anger in the form of hostility, delinquency, running away or gang activity. Our youth are speaking through their actions but few adults are listening and getting the message. And we can reduce recidivism by addressing their problems at the core.

Analysis: What Is Going Wrong?

Older generations are spending more time talking at or talking about youths ages 13-21 than listening to their generation reaching out for guidance. The youth are not being told that they are a huge part of their own solution. Nor are they being taught how to cope with conflict, anger and community or social pressures. The youth then lean towards finding popular role models who are negative in their behavior, music and influences. These poor role models, whether they are in music, gangs, game systems or movies, are negatively programming our children's minds and behaviors because these are the culprits preying on our youth as they struggle for identity, identity found in the wrong places.



Youth Open Forum Town Hall Meetings (Page 2)

Format:

The format for these meetings is an open forum and panel discussion with the youth doing most of the talking and the adults doing more of the listening. Meetings are open to the public and last for a period of two hours once a week.

Audience:

We request the support and attendance of law enforcement, parents, teachers, juvenile justice staff, the courts, social workers, district attorneys, principals, clergy, business professionals, civic and community leaders and concerned citizens.

Then What?


The Atlanta Crime Commission offers and partners with several prevention and intervention programs including internships, volunteer programs, entrepreneur programs, crime prevention seminars and workshops, problem resolution and life skills training, drug awareness, sports and educational enhancement programs. Students can complete their community service requirements and we are even in the process of seeking to offer these alternatives to those caught up in the court/legal system.

Subject Matter:

Youth ages 13-21 are selected for the panel and one young person is selected as a moderator. A set of 20 questions are posed to the youth for open, candid discussion. Topics include fears, anger, conflict resolution, interacting with law enforcement, resources, profiling, role models, positive and negative influences, and what they need from the adult community.

ACQUIRING THE YOUTH
